Though we are a diverse congregation with different perspectives on many of the great issues facing the Church today, we are united in a common love of liturgy and music. Though we have had troubled periods in our history, there is a real sense that these are behind us. In recent years we have sought to enhance our liturgical life and to put our finances and fabric in good order. Indeed we have witnessed an increase in our membership. We are coming to the end of a major restoration project (funded with assistance from the Heritage Lottery Fund and other
retained or relinquished	external bodies) which will leave our Church wind and watertight enabling us to focus on further congregational growth and upon the refurbishment of our toilets and the restoration of our historic organ.

We have been a popular venue for concerts and recitals hosting around twenty concerts a year.
